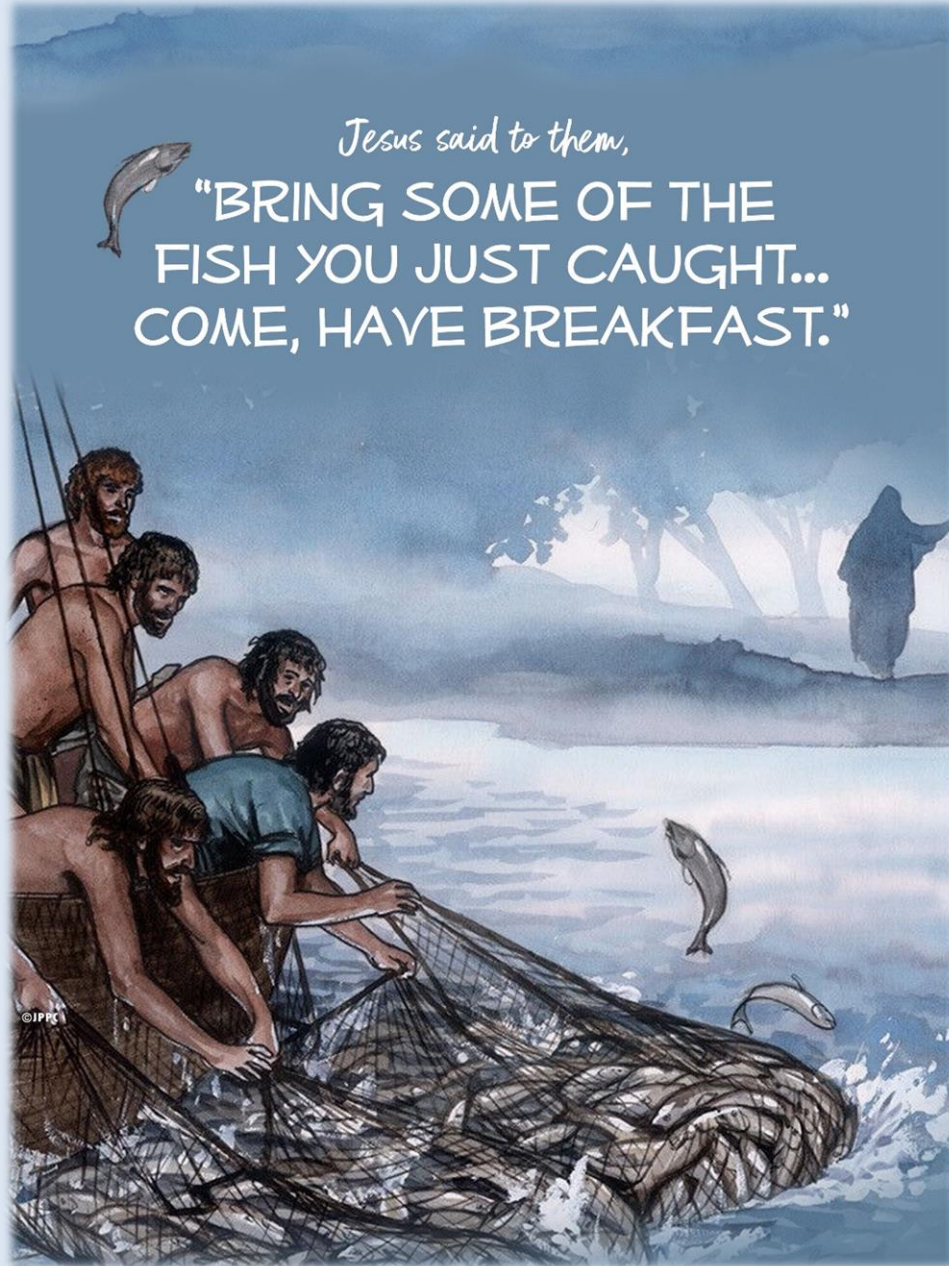

From Father Rodney

Father's columns for the weekend of April 24 and May 1 were switched by accident. Please see Father's reflections below from last week, April 24.

On Holy Saturday, three men and women were received into the Church after they gave their consent and each stated, "I believe and profess all that the holy Catholic Church believes, teaches, and proclaims to be revealed by God." I then received them into communion full communion with over 1 billion Catholics world-wide as I addressed them with the following words:

(Name), the Lord receives you into the Catholic Church. His loving kindness has led you here, so that in the unity of the Holy Spirit you may have full communion with us in the faith that you have professed in the presence of his family.

During the Easter Season, the first reading is taken from the Acts of the Apostles. One of the most fascinating things about Acts is that it is a chronicle of the early Church and one of the things that we learn about the early Church is that it quickly grew, and it grew because of the persistence of the Apostles. Leading up to the Ascension of Jesus and the coming of the Promised Spirit at Pentecost, we read that the Church was constantly adding new members. For example, last weekend, we heard how boldly the Apostles preached Christ crucified and Risen from the dead. It was with great faith in the Resurrection of Jesus that gave the Apostles the unfailing conviction to speak the Name. For your convenience, I have reprinted the short selection from last weekend's Mass as an example of the bold faith and increase the early Church experienced.

Many signs and wonders were done among the people at the hands of the apostles. They were all together in Solomon's portico. None of the others dared to join them, but the people esteemed them. Yet more than ever, believers in the Lord, great numbers of men and women, were added to them. Thus they even carried the sick out into the streets and laid them on cots and mats so that when Peter came by, at least his shadow might fall on one or another of them. A large number of people from the towns in the vicinity of Jerusalem also gathered, bringing the sick and those disturbed by unclean spirits, and they were all cured. (Acts 5:12-16)

May we do our part to continue the growth of the Church in the 21st by spreading the Good News. Perhaps an Easter challenge: invite one friend or family member to join you at church on a Sunday morning. An invitation can go a long way. Look at what it did for the early Church. Happy Easter!

As we journey through Easter, we will read from Acts of the Apostles. This account of the early Church is remarkable. As I stated last week in my column, the infant Church experienced immense growth and strength. Today, we encounter Saint Peter who has really changed his tune. It has not been all that long since we heard Jesus predict that Peter would deny him three times before the cock crowed and now Peter is boldly proclaiming Jesus to be the Savior. It must be remembered that the Eleven were scared for their lives. The Jewish leaders did not want the news of Jesus's Resurrection to spread yet the more that they attempted to suppress the Eleven the more boldly they were desirous to spread the Good News. I guess that is the utterly amazing thing about speaking the truth: the more we speak it, the more we feel emboldened to speak the truth. This can manifest itself in so many facets of our lives. When challenged because of our beliefs, we can sometimes feel compelled to remain silent, thereby compromising who we are. Think about it for a minute: you are with co-workers or friends or relatives and a discussion regarding faith and morals ensues, and you are seemingly outnumbered. In an effort to not muddy the waters, you suddenly decide that you'd much rather keep the peace, if you will, and choose to remain silent allowing those who disagree with you to silence your voice. If they Eleven had done that, who knows how the Church might have evolved. Jesus once said that "the truth will set you free" and yes indeed it will. Never be ashamed to boldly proclaim your view and who you are. Never compromise your beliefs because they might be not popular. The Eleven were preaching a message that the Elders of the people did not want spoken however they persisted and were victorious. You can be as well! He is Risen from the dead just as He said! Happy Easter!

Eastertime

A Sense of the Season

First, we kept the forty days, with praying, fasting and giving alms. Then we celebrated the three days of Christ's passion, dying and rising. Now we delight in the fifty days, with rejoicing, feasting and giving witness! The season of Easter is fifty days long. It is a time of unbridled joy, of exuberant rejoicing. The church tells us, "The fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost are celebrated in joyful exultation as one feast day, or better as one 'great Sunday.' These above all others are days for the singing of the Alleluia." (*General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar, #22*)

Why is Eastertime fifty days? The ancient cultures that gave us the Bible had great respect for numbers. They believed that numbers contained hints about God and the meaning of life. The number seven was thought to contain fullness: There are seven days in the week, according to God's original way of ordering time, creating all that there is and resting. So if you multiply 7 times 7, you have "fullness times fullness."

But wait! 727 is 49! With God, there is always more—more than we can ever imagine. So our holy season of Easter is even more than "fullness times fullness." It's "fullness times fullness" and then some: 727+1. That's what love is like: more than we can ever imagine. That's what heaven is going to be like: more than we can ever imagine. The fifty days are days for looking for the risen Lord among us, for hearing in each other's stories of rising from the big and small deaths, days when we experience something of Christ's triumphs. That's why we look to the newly baptized, robed in bright new clothes and oily with gladness: At Easter, they died and rose with Christ! Now they take their places with us. Together, like the apostles who were so full of the Spirit that people thought they were drunk, we rush about with good and giddy news: Death is not the last word! Life and love are forever! And slowly, painstakingly, we work together, together with Christ, to change this world into the world to come. Sing Alleluia!

Third Sunday of Easter

FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

When the captain and the court officers had brought the apostles in and made them stand before the Sanhedrin, the high priest questioned them, "We gave you strict orders, did we not, to stop teaching in that name? Yet you have filled Jerusalem with your teaching and want to bring this man's blood upon us." But Peter and the apostles said in reply, "We must obey God rather than men. The God of our ancestors raised Jesus, though you had him killed by hanging him on a tree. God exalted him at his right hand as leader and savior to grant Israel repentance and forgiveness of sins. We are witnesses of these things, as is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him."

The Sanhedrin ordered the apostles to stop speaking in the name of Jesus, and dismissed them. So they left the presence of the Sanhedrin, rejoicing that they had been found worthy to suffer dishonor for the sake of the name.

GOSPEL

according to John

Glory to you, O Lord.

At that time, Jesus revealed himself again to his disciples at the Sea of Tiberias. He revealed himself in this way. Together were Simon Peter, Thomas called Didymus, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, Zebedee's sons, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We also will come with you." So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. When it was already dawn, Jesus was standing on the shore; but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?" They answered him, "No." So he said to them, "Cast the net over the right side of the boat and you will find something." So they cast it, and were not able to pull it in because of the number of fish. So the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord." When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he tucked in his garment, for he was lightly clad, and jumped into the sea. The other disciples

came in the boat, they were not far from shore, only about a hundred yards, dragging the net with the fish. When they climbed out on shore, they saw a charcoal fire with fish on it and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you just caught." So Simon Peter went over and dragged the net ashore full of one hundred fifty-three large fish. Even though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come, have breakfast." And none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they realized it was the Lord. Jesus came over and took the bread and gave it to them, and in like manner the fish. This was now the third time Jesus was revealed to his disciples after being raised from the dead.

[When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon, son of John, do you love me more than these?" Simon Peter answered him, "Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." He then said to Simon Peter a second time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Simon Peter answered him, Yes, Lord, you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." Jesus said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was distressed that Jesus had said to him a third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. Amen, amen, I say to you, when you were younger, you used to dress yourself and go where you wanted; but when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go." He said this signifying by what kind of death he would glorify God. And when he had said this, he said to him, "Follow me."]

Say NO to Physician Assisted Suicide in Massachusetts **LET YOUR VOICE BE HEARD NOW!**

The Massachusetts State Legislature is considering passing into law two deeply troubling bills this session which would legalize Physician Assisted Suicide. The bills, House 2381 and Senate 1384, are identical in text and titled “*An Act relative to end of life options*”.

“The Catholic Bishops of Massachusetts stand united in our strong opposition to Physician Assisted Suicide. It is an affront to life and a dangerous precedent for determining end of life issues. Physicians are trained to care for the ill, not to hasten death.”¹

Here are some troubling facts to consider before you act:

1) The bills would allow a physician to provide a deadly drug mixture to an individual diagnosed with less than 6 months to live that, when consumed, would cause death. **NOTE-** The diagnosis could be wrong. Countless individuals have outlived that 6-month diagnosis and enjoyed many more precious months and years with family and friends.

2) No Real Safeguards - A vulnerable individual who is physically disabled, depressed, or fears being a “burden” may be subject to undue influence by others to take the drug mixture, especially if there is a financial benefit as an incentive.

3) The primary focus of elected officials should be dedicated to legislation providing quality health care, mental health care and palliative care to the sick and dying – particularly in the underserved, poor and minority communities that suffer the most at the time of need.

How can your voice be heard?

Call or email your legislators, let them know you are a Massachusetts voter, and say NO to Physician Assisted Suicide!
